- (1) Effective 2013-14, Chief Joseph and Ockley Green merged to form Chief Joseph/Ockley Green K-8.
- (2) Effective 2012-13, Humboldt closed. Students from Humboldt neighborhood now attend Boise-Eliot/Humboldt.
- (3) Effective 2012-13, Young Women's Leadership Academy closed.
- (4) Effective 2011-12, Marshall closed. Students in the Harrison Park K-8 School area attend Madison High School. Students in the Kelly and Woodmere Elementary School areas, and the Bridger, Lent and Marysville K-8 areas, attend Franklin High School. Students in the Whitman Elementary School area attend Cleveland High School.
- (5) Effective 2011-12, students in the Jefferson cluster have the choice to attend either the new Jefferson Middle College program or a neighborhood comprehensive high school program at Roosevelt, Madison or Grant, depending on where they live within the Jefferson cluster boundaries.
- (6) For the 2011-12 school year, Rigler neighborhood 7th and 8th graders attended Vernon.
- (7) Effective 2010-11, Clarendon-Portsmouth was renamed César Chávez.
- (8) Effective 2008-09, Binnsmead closed and the Clark School students and staff moved from the Clark site to the Binnsmead site. The school was renamed Harrison Park. The Creative Science School Program (CSSP) expanded and moved from Bridger Elementary to the Clark site.
- (9) ACCESS is a district-wide alternative education program. Starting in 2013-14, it is located at the Rose City Park site.
- (10) In 2009-10 Scott and Rigler became K-8 schools. Effective 2008-09, Scott and Rigler remained K-7 schools, and those students that matriculated from 7th to 8th grade attended at the Madison 8th grade academy.
- (11) Effective 2007-08, Clarendon ES and Portsmouth MS merged to form a K-8 school. Enrollment counts for years prior to 2007-08 for Clarendon consist of grades K-5 only. Enrollment counts for Portsmouth prior to 2007-08 are contained in the MS section of this report. Similarly, Hollyrood ES and Fernwood MS merged to form a K-8 school (renamed Beverly Cleary) as did Rose City Park ES and Gregory Heights MS (renamed Roseway Heights).
- (12) Effective 2007-08, Kellogg MS was closed. Eighth grade students that would have been enrolled at Kellogg for the 2007-08 school year were enrolled at Franklin HS. Tubman MS was also closed and a new Young Women's Academy was opened on the Tubman campus as part of Jefferson High School. Lee, Lent, Marysville, Peninsula, Sabin, Skyline, Vestal, Woodlawn became K-8 schools. In 2007-08 Beach, Clarendon-Portsmouth, Beverly Cleary, King, Roseway Heights, Vernon became K-8 schools.
- (14) Day and Residential Treatment Programs (long-term care and treatment).
- (15) No students enrolled for current school year.
- (16) Effective 2006-07, Meek Professional Technical HS, Portland Night HS at Grant, Marshall Night HS, and Madison Focus (shown in Madison enrollment in prior years) merged to form Alliance High School.
- (17) Effective 2006-07, Ockley Green converted from a middle school to a K-8, and Kellogg and Portsmouth no longer received sixth grade students.
- (18) Effective 2005-06, two high schools located at the Marshall campus, Linus Pauling Academy and Portland Academy of International Studies, merged into one school renamed Pauling Academy of Integrated Sciences.
- (19) Applegate, Edwards, Kenton, Richmond and Smith Elementary Schools were closed at the end of the 2004-05 school year. Whitaker Middle school was closed as well. Most elementary school-aged students residing in the Applegate neighborhood area went on to attend Woodlawn. Similarly, students residing in the Edwards neighborhood area went on to attend Abernethy, those at Kenton to Chief Joseph; those at Richmond to Abernethy, Creston or Glencoe; and those at Smith went on to Capitol Hill, Maplewood or Markham. Most middle school students residing in the Whitaker neighborhood area went on to attend Tubman. A new focus/option school was established at the
- (20) Effective 2004-05, the Environmental Middle School combined with Sunnyside Elementary and was renamed Sunnyside Environmental School. In addition, the Odyssey program and its students (formerly at Chapman Elementary) moved to Hayhurst Elementary. The Family Cooperative program (formerly at Sunnyside) moved to Bridger
- (21) The Pioneer program consists of elementary, middle and high school programs. It was formerly known as ES B Program at Youngson, MS B Program at Foster and HS B Program at Columbia.

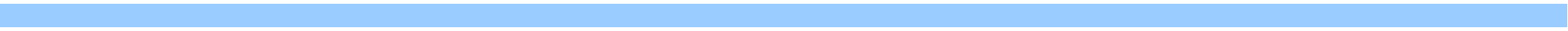
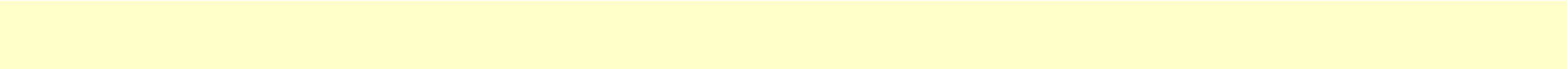
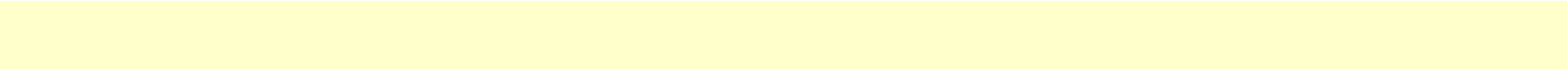

Federal Child Nutrition (FCN)

While school breakfasts and lunches are available to all students at most sites, some students are eligible for either free or reduced-price meals based on family size and income information supplied voluntarily by parents. The federal government provides funds for student breakfasts through the National School Breakfast Program and lunches through the National School Lunch Program.

FCN data are based on data in Synergy extracted on 11/30/2013, unless noted below.

Head Start by definition is 100% eligible.

Rosa Parks is a Provision 2 school where 100% of students are considered eligible for free meals; percentages shown represent Provision 2 base year eligibility.

Parry Center, Rosemont, Clinton Street, White Shield, Wildflowers are Residential Child Care Institutions where 100% of students are eligible for free meals.

Charters and Community-Based Alternative Programs do not necessarily use the PPS Nutrition Services Program and FCN numbers shown may be lower than actual, and are preliminary until they have been reviewed by those programs.

LEP

Limited English Proficient (LEP) is the count of students eligible to receive English as a Second Language (ESL) or Bilingual Services. (Source: Synergy)

SpEd
